7. No nursing or pregnant cats at the show.
8. Cats must be on leash or in carrier except when judging.

HORTICULTURE FIELD CROPS - RULES

1. For a sheaf exhibit, cut several hundred stalks of clean straw with good ripe heads and strip off the leaves. Tie the stalks into a neat, attractive bundle and square off the end with knife or shears.
2. For a threshed grain exhibit, run a bushel through the fanning mill several times and provide a peck of plump uniform kernels.
3. When corn is exhibited before it is ripe, it is shown as bundles of four stalks. Stalks should be uniform in size and height and should have good ears of uniform maturity on shanks of uniform length. The ears should be uniform in height on the stalks, 3 to 3 1/2 feet from the bottom. Corn stalks must be exhibited in a plastic bag that is placed in a plastic pail.
4. One exhibit per entry number.
5. All entries must be tagged with the named variety of the crop.

VEGETABLES and FRUIT RULES

1. Entries in the vegetable exhibits shall fit into an area 15" square without stacking.
2. The products for each entry must come from the exhibitor's garden.
3. Any exhibit not having the required number of vegetables will be disqualified. Exhibits must have the exact number as stated in the book.
4. Display plates will be furnished for all vegetable classes by the Fair.
5. Vegetables should be prepared according to suggestions in the booklet "Selecting and Preparing Vegetables for Display." Call UW-extension office to order booklet #720.0929-C.
6. For garden boxes refer to the number of items in Class C for quantity of each vegetable you will need to exhibit. You determine the variety exhibited.

JUNIOR FLOWERS AND PLANTS

Department 215

RULES

1. Members are to exhibit in the class which corresponds to the unit in which they are enrolled.
2. Members must furnish their own vases for flowers. PLEASE DO NOT BRING POTS OR VASES OF VALUE to the Fair. All containers are brought at the owner's risk.
3. Potted plants should have an appropriate drain dish under the plant container.
4. Flowers are judged 60 percent on the flowers and 40 percent on the arrangement.
5. Plants must be clean and free from insects and disease injury. Unhealthy plants will be disqualified, rejected and sent home by the Superintendent.
6. House plants must be labeled with the correct name.
7. All house plant entries must have been started from slips, cuttings, seeds, or bulbs since September 1 except in Class B entries 8-10.
8. All cut flowers exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor.
9. One exhibit per entry number.
